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Chapter 1

Your Personal Invitation

You have a deep longing inside of your heart and mind for something more. This is why you feel discontentment at times. You always want something more than what you have – physically, spiritually, and emotionally. Your life is not always fulfilling. That desire for worth and greatness is still there, and your mind, body, and spirit will not rest until you have it.

Consider the following scientific facts:

- You are the only person on earth with your fingerprint. No one else has your fingerprint.
- You are the only person on earth with your voice. No one else sounds like you do.
- You are the only person on earth with your face. No one else looks exactly like you do.

This shows that you are very unique. You are one of a kind. You have gifts, talents, and a calling different from every other human being on earth. You were created for something more. You were created by God for a great purpose. This purpose can only be found by coming to know God on a personal basis.

Who or what is God? God is your Father. He is the architect of the entire universe. He has simply always existed. He dwells in Heaven. God's first begotten Son is named Jesus. The Son has always been with the Father. They have always existed.

In this booklet, you are going to learn about the reason why you were born, which is to be a child of God. Our earthly parents are human; they can only do so much for us. Your earthly father or mother may not have been there for you like you wanted them to be. When you humble yourself to receive Jesus, you become a child of God. You will have a Father that will speak to you, nurture you, and provide for your needs in a way that humans cannot.

Chapter 2

The Bible Story

In this chapter, we will look at the basics of God, the story of mankind, and God's love for you. The story of mankind is derived from the book of the Creator, called the Holy Bible. The Bible is the story of God's interactions with mankind. It is a love story. In this amazing book, God details His plan to bring you into His family despite your past and present struggles.

I recommend an easy to read version like the New King James or New International Version. When you first open the Bible, you will see a listing of all the books of the Bible. There are 66 books in the Bible. The first book of the Bible is called the Book of Genesis. This is where we will start explaining the Bible. You will want to have a Bible handy as we go through this chapter. I have included some verses to help you follow along.

In the very beginning, only God the Father and His Son Jesus existed. They decided to create the entire universe – the Father was the architect and the Son of God did the work of creating. How did they create everything? The Father shared the design with the Son, who then spoke the Father's plan into existence. They worked together toward the same purpose.

As part of creation, they made angels. These angels are spirits. This means that they are invisible to the human eye. They were created to assist the Father and the Son in watching over the world. When you look around at the moon, the sun, the trees, the grass, and everything in nature, it was all created by the Son of God.

In the process of creating the world, the Son also made sea creatures, land animals, and finally mankind. The Son of God took some dust from the earth and formed the first human. He breathed into this person and gave him life. This first person was named Adam. He placed Adam in a Garden, which was called Eden.

Eden is a word that means “delightful.” It was a beautiful, enjoyable Garden.

The Son brought all of the animals to Adam so that he could name them. In this process, the Son also made another human. There were plenty of animals, but there were no other people. Jesus put Adam to sleep and used a rib from the man’s side to make a companion for him. This companion was female. Females were the counterpart to males. Men and women were both created to work with each other. In the beginning, they went by one name – Adam – but they were two individuals with one name. The Son came down in the Garden of Eden and fellowshiped with mankind.

When Adam was placed in the Garden, they were given a few simple instructions to obey.

Genesis 1:28

“28 God blessed them and said to them, ‘Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground.’”

Genesis 2:15-17

“15 The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.

16 And the Lord God commanded the man, ‘You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; 17 but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die.’”

Basically, the Father and the Son wanted them to rule the world. They were also to reproduce and have children. These children would be raised to live the same way as their parents, obeying and spending time with God. Life would be great and free from worry. God was establishing His Kingdom on earth through mankind.

Part of their Kingdom duties was to take care of the Garden of Eden. There were many trees in this beautiful place of delight. In the middle of the Garden, two trees were placed: the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil and the Tree of Life. They were free to eat from every tree in the Garden except the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.

The Tree of Life was the tree of eternal life. By eating fruit from this tree, Adam would receive the Holy Spirit of God. They would be able to receive true spiritual knowledge and live forever in perfect peace. It would open the way to an exciting, fulfilling life. The Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil was the tree of natural knowledge. By eating the fruit from this tree, mankind would see things from a natural perspective. They would experience both good **and** evil. The Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil would cause hurt and pain.

We learn from **Genesis 3:1-7** that Adam was tempted by a serpent.

3:1 Now the serpent was more crafty than any of the wild animals the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, “Did God really say, ‘You must not eat from any tree in the garden?’” 2 The woman said to the serpent, “We may eat fruit from the trees in the garden, 3 but God did say, ‘You must not eat fruit from the tree that is in the middle of the garden, and you must not touch it, or you will die.’” 4 “You will not certainly die,” the serpent said to the woman. 5 “For God knows that when you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.” 6 When the woman saw that the fruit of the tree was good for food and pleasing to the eye, and also desirable for gaining wisdom, she took some and ate it. She also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. 7 Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized they were naked; so they sewed fig leaves together and made coverings for themselves.

Why would the serpent try to lead humans astray? One of the original angels, named Lucifer, rebelled against the Father and the Son. This renegade angel fights against them. He rebelled before

humans were created. Since humans were created in God's image, Lucifer works against humans. Lucifer is also called Satan or the devil. Satan means "adversary" and devil means "slanderer."

In the last book of the Bible, called Revelation, we learn that the serpent is Satan: "And the great dragon was cast out, that old serpent, called the Devil, and Satan, which deceiveth the whole world: he was cast out into the earth, and his angels were cast out with him" (Rev. 12:9).

Satan spoke through this serpent to trick Adam to eat from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. The Bible verses above explain that both men and women ate from this Tree. Their eyes were opened. What does this mean?

It means that no longer would humans see the world from God's eyes or perspective. From that point forward, each human would choose right from wrong according to his or her own view. All humans born from that point onward would experience the hurt and pain that comes from choosing our own way to live. In the Garden, man and woman disobeyed God's Words. Anytime we disobey God's Words, we sin.

When they sinned, they faced the consequences. We still feel these consequences today. Adam was removed from the Garden. Adam's actions opened the way for curses to enter the world. To the female aspect of Adam, the Lord said:

Genesis 3:16

"I will make your pains in childbearing very severe; with painful labor you will give birth to children. Your desire will be for your husband, and he will rule over you."

From this point forward, women would have pains in childbearing. She would desire to rule over her husband, but he would rule over her. God was forcing men to be responsible for their households. To the male aspect of Adam, the Lord said:

Genesis 3:17-19

“Cursed is the ground because of you; through painful toil you will eat food from it all the days of your life. 18 It will produce thorns and thistles for you, and you will eat the plants of the field. 19 By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food until you return to the ground, since from it you were taken; for dust you are and to dust you will return. 20 Adam named his wife Eve, because she would become the mother of all the living.”

Adam would have to work hard on a cursed earth with thorns and thistles. He would have to work so hard that he would sweat. Life was going to be tough. It was at this time that the female aspect of Adam was named Eve.

Before they sinned, the original name “Adam” applied to the first male and female. This means there was one name for two individuals. After they sinned, they became two people with two different names: Adam, who was male, and Eve, who was female. From this time forward, men and women have experienced tremendous problems understanding one another. In the beginning, God wanted husbands and wives to have a unique unity. Sin caused disunity in the marriage relationship between men and women. This still exists today. Part of God’s plan is to bring back unity to husbands and wives.

By eating from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, Adam and Eve made their lives much harder. By eating from the Tree of Life, they would have only experienced a life full of good, pleasant things. Unfortunately, they chose the hard, painful way.

Have you ever wondered why bad things happen? Bad things happen because we all choose right from wrong for ourselves. We decide we want live our way. We act according to what our eyes see, our ears hear, and how we feel. This means we will also face the consequences of our decisions. We choose things that often cause us hurt and pain. This started in the Garden. We behave the same way today.

The very first children of Adam and Eve were Cain and Abel. The cycle of sin and pain continued in their lives.

Genesis 4:1-8 reads:

4:1 Adam made love to his wife Eve, and she became pregnant and gave birth to Cain. She said, “With the help of the Lord I have brought forth a man.” 2 Later she gave birth to his brother Abel. Now Abel kept flocks, and Cain worked the soil. 3 In the course of time Cain brought some of the fruits of the soil as an offering to the Lord. 4 And Abel also brought an offering—fat portions from some of the firstborn of his flock. The Lord looked with favor on Abel and his offering, 5 but on Cain and his offering he did not look with favor. So Cain was very angry, and his face was downcast. 6 Then the Lord said to Cain, “Why are you angry? Why is your face downcast? 7 If you do what is right, will you not be accepted? But if you do not do what is right, sin is crouching at your door; it desires to have you, but you must rule over it.” 8 Now Cain said to his brother Abel, “Let’s go out to the field.” While they were in the field, Cain attacked his brother Abel and killed him.

Cain killed his brother. His brother Abel was innocent. He had never hurt Cain. Cain was jealous of Abel and allowed this jealousy to overcome him. Cain hated Abel and did not want Abel to live any more. He sinned by killing his brother. Because of his sin, Cain became a wanderer on the earth. His sin hurt his parents and caused him to live a much harder life. You can see from the story how sin makes our lives more complicated. It hurts us and everyone around us.

This cycle of hurt and pain continued for over 1,000 years. It was so bad that the entire world was full of hurt and pain. The world was full of hatred. People were killing each other on a large scale.

Genesis 6:5-8

“5 The Lord saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of

the human heart was only evil all the time. 6 The Lord regretted that he had made human beings on the earth, and his heart was deeply troubled. 7 So the Lord said, ‘I will wipe from the face of the earth the human race I have created—and with them the animals, the birds and the creatures that move along the ground—for I regret that I have made them.’ 8 But Noah found favor in the eyes of the Lord.”

God made a difficult decision; He decided to destroy the entire world. In fact, God only found one person in the entire world that had not been corrupted by this hatred. His name was Noah. God commissioned Noah with the task of building a huge boat. This boat would be used to house him, his wife, his three sons and their wives (8 people total). This boat would also be used to house seven pairs of clean animals and two pairs of unclean animals.

Genesis 7:1-3

“1 The Lord then said to Noah, ‘Go into the ark, you and your whole family, because I have found you righteous in this generation. 2 Take with you seven pairs of every kind of clean animal, a male and its mate, and one pair of every kind of unclean animal, a male and its mate, 3 and also seven pairs of every kind of bird, male and female, to keep their various kinds alive throughout the earth.”

God wanted to keep mankind alive, but He wanted to keep mankind alive in an environment that was healthy for all humans. In mercifully removing all of the humans who were not related to Noah, God was protecting future generations from being born in a world full of hatred. This was an act of mercy on God’s part for future generations.

God spared seven pairs of the clean animals because clean animals were food. Unclean animals were created to clean up the earth and keep the cycle of life going for the environment. The difference between clean and unclean animals is explained in Leviticus chapter 11. When the flood came, Noah and his family

were protected. The animals on the Ark were spared. Man and animal came off of the boat and started the task of re-populating the earth.

It was not long after the flood that mankind began to fall farther away from God. They tried to build a tower up to Heaven. They also wanted to build a city. Like the lead angel Lucifer that had rebelled against God, mankind wanted to replace God. They wanted to do things their way. Instead of calling upon God in prayer, they wanted to make themselves on the same level as God. God then confused the languages.

Genesis 11:1-3

11:1 Now the whole world had one language and a common speech. 2 As people moved eastward, they found a plain in Shinar and settled there. 3 They said to each other, “Come, let’s make bricks and bake them thoroughly.” They used brick instead of stone, and tar for mortar. 4 Then they said, “Come, let us build ourselves a city, with a tower that reaches to the heavens, so that we may make a name for ourselves; otherwise we will be scattered over the face of the whole earth.”

Genesis 11:8-9

“8 So the Lord scattered them from there over all the earth, and they stopped building the city. 9 That is why it was called Babel—because there the Lord confused the language of the whole world. From there the Lord scattered them over the face of the whole earth.”

Before this event, the entire world spoke the same language. This means that we could perfectly understand each other. Humans could cooperate and get along much easier because there many barriers of communication did not exist. After the Tower of Babel, humans had different languages. These different languages meant that mankind would have to learn to humble themselves before God to reach out to Him. Mankind could not rely on each other to try and replace God. After this, mankind began to scatter out across the earth.

As time passed, God chose a man by the name of Abram to be his representative on earth. He would be like Noah in that God would use him to help other people see the Way of God versus the way of hurt and pain. God asked Abram to leave his father's household. He left his family in the land of the Chaldees (which is the country we call Turkey today), and he came to the land of Canaan (the country we call Israel today).

God made a covenant with Abram and even changed his name to Abraham. A **covenant** is an agreement between two people. In this covenant, God made many promises to him. The land of Canaan was given to him as an eternal inheritance. This is why the land known today as modern-day Israel is also called the Promised Land. This is name I will use for the land of Israel going forward in this booklet. This land was promised to Abraham and his descendants.

Another of these promises involved having a son. Years passed by, and it seemed that Abraham would not have the son that God promised him. Finally, when he was 99 years old and his wife was 90, they had a child. His name was Isaac. You can read about these events in **Genesis Chapters 11 through 22**.

Abraham was a special representative of God. In fact, God said of Abraham:

Genesis 26:4

“Abraham obeyed me and did everything I required of him, keeping my commands, my decrees and my instructions.”

Abraham obeyed God by simply trusting in the Son of God. He did not have a Bible and there were no preachers or churches. He prayed and sought after God with all of his heart. He had complete confidence that God was guiding him at all times.

A **covenant** is an agreement between two people. One person agrees to perform some action as long as the other person per-

forms an action. If I agree to buy a piece of land from you for \$1,000, then my covenant obligation is to give you \$1,000. Your covenant obligation is to release the property to my possession.

Abraham and God had a covenant together. Abraham obeyed God as part of his covenant obligations. God kept His end of the covenant by giving him a son and providing many blessings for his family and for future generations. God protected and provided for Abraham.

Abraham's son was named Isaac. The Covenant with Abraham along with its blessings was passed on to him. Isaac passed the covenant and promises onto his son Jacob (who was also called by the name Israel). Jacob gave birth to twelve sons. These events are recorded in **Genesis chapters 23 through 36**.

One of Jacob's sons was named Joseph. He was a dreamer. God gave Joseph wisdom to save the nation of Egypt from a terrible time of famine. Joseph was also used to save his family from this same famine. Due to the famine, the twelve sons of Jacob ended up moving from the Promised Land into the land of Egypt. These events are recorded in **Genesis chapters 37 through 50**.

As time passed, they grew and prospered. They became a great nation divided into twelve tribes. Each tribe was named after one of Jacob's sons. After a few hundred years, a king ruled Egypt that did not remember Joseph or the Israelites. He mistreated them and made them slaves. In their misery, they cried out to God.

God answered their petition and raised up a deliverer named Moses. He went to the ruler of Egypt (called Pharaoh) and delivered a message from God to let the people of Israel leave the land. Pharaoh refused to let the people go. God did mighty signs and wonders, pouring out 10 plagues on the land. This loosened Pharaoh's hard heart, and he let the Israelites leave. God led the Israelites out of Egypt and through the desert where he provided for them.

God led the people to a mountain called Horeb. At this mountain God established a covenant with the Israelites. This was a national covenant where He would make them the leading nation on earth; they would be His representatives before all the other nations. In the second book of the Bible, called Exodus, we read about these events.

Exodus 19:3-6 - 3 Then Moses went up to God, and the Lord called to him from the mountain and said, “This is what you are to say to the descendants of Jacob and what you are to tell the people of Israel: 4 ‘You yourselves have seen what I did to Egypt, and how I carried you on eagles’ wings and brought you to myself. 5 Now if you obey me fully and keep my covenant, then out of all nations you will be my treasured possession. Although the whole earth is mine, 6 you will be for me a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.’ These are the words you are to speak to the Israelites.”

This covenant was established forever with the Israelites. God agreed to lift them up above the nations, take care of their needs and defeat their enemies. In return, they were His chosen people on earth to lead the world in the right way of living. They were to display the Way of Life that would lead back to the Tree of Life. God was once again trying to establish His Kingdom on earth through mankind. He was using the nation of Israel to accomplish this goal. They were to be an instrument of God to lead the world away from the way of hurt and pain.

God gave to the Israelites guidelines called the Law of God that would help guide them toward a fulfilling, satisfying life. This was an expression of God’s love to the people of Israel because it would give them practical wisdom and instruction on how to live a healthy, satisfying life. It taught them how to love God and people. This Way of Love would show the rest of the world how to live. It pointed them back to the Tree of Life. This way of life is summarized in **Exodus Chapters 20 through 23**. The Ten Commandments are another way to summarize God’s loving instruc-

tion. They are listed below:

- 1) You will have no other gods.
- 2) You will not bow down to idols.
- 3) You will not take His name in vain.
- 4) Honor the Sabbath day and keep it holy.
- 5) Honor your Father and your Mother.
- 6) Do not commit adultery.
- 7) Do not murder.
- 8) Do not steal.
- 9) Do not lie.
- 10) Do not covet other people's possessions, their spouse, or anything else that belongs to them.

After establishing this covenant with them, God led them to the Promised Land that was given to Abraham. They established a kingdom that ruled over this territory.

After many years passed, the Israelites became divided into two kingdoms. Instead of being one nation called Israel, they were two nations. The northern kingdom was called the house of Israel. Ten of the twelve tribes of Israel made up this Kingdom. The southern kingdom was called the house of Judah, and two tribes lived in it. The peoples of the southern kingdom are sometimes called "Jews." These events are recorded in the books of the Bible **Joshua all the way through I Kings chapter 12.**

Both of these kingdoms refused to honor God's covenant with them. They disobeyed God's Way of Life; they disobeyed His Ten Commandments. It invited sickness, disease, and famine into the Promised Land. They experienced hurt and pain. Instead of being a leader among other countries, they were mocked for their poor behavior.

God sent them prophets, or His personal spokespersons, to correct them. These men and women always pointed the people of Israel back to the original covenant they made with God on Mount

Horeb. They pointed them back to the way of love their ancestors agreed to follow. This is recorded in **I Kings Chapters 13 through 22 and the entire book of II Kings**. You can also read about these events in the Prophetic books starting with **Isaiah and ending with Malachi**.

God warned them in **Leviticus 26 and Deuteronomy 28** that they would be forced to leave the Promised Land if they continued to live opposite the way of life that He gave them. Because they refused to live the right way, they were defeated by their enemies. The northern tribes, or house of Israel, were taken captive by the Assyrians between 721 and 718 BC (the ancient country called Assyria lived in northern Iraq in ancient times). They have never returned to the Promised Land. They scattered and became other nations on planet earth.

The southern tribes, or house of Judah (Jewish people), returned back to God several times. Eventually, they turned completely away from Him. They were removed from the Promised Land. A large group of them were taken to Babylon (the country we call Iraq today) in 586 BC. They were allowed to return to the Promised Land 70 years later.

For many years, the Jewish people lived in the Promised Land. Other empires ruled over them. In about 3 BC, Jesus Christ (the Son of God) left Heaven and was born of a woman. He had always lived with the Father in Heaven in perfect happiness. The Son of God put on humanity. He did this for you and me so that we could be reconciled back to God the Father. He came and preached a message of repentance, which means turning back to God. Jesus taught mankind about the Way to the Tree of Life. He taught us not to live in the way of hurt and pain like Adam, Eve, Cain, and the rebellious people of Israel and Judah. He preached that we should receive the Kingdom of God. Once again, God the Father was seeking to establish His Kingdom with mankind.

After a 3 ½ year ministry, Jesus was arrested and put on trial for crimes He did not commit. Jesus had never broken the laws of

man or the Law of God. At the trial, He did not defend Himself; on the contrary, He willingly gave up his life for you. **These events are recorded in the books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.**

Each of us has sinned and broken the Spiritual Law of God. We have broken the Ten Commandments inwardly and outwardly. We deserve the second death in the Lake of Fire for this. The second death is a permanent, eternal separation from God. However, Jesus died for you and me so we could have another chance at life.

Jesus was beaten, flogged, spit upon, and despised. He died on a wooden cross – rejected, despised, and abused. Three days and nights later (72 hours), Jesus resurrected. He came back to life. He resurrected to eternal life and went back to Heaven. He was so obedient and love so consumed His life and motivations that death could not hold Him. He is now sitting beside His Father, waiting for you and me to join His Family.

Jesus came to earth and experienced every hurt, pain, heartache, and disappointment that you have ever faced. He lived perfectly and died for you so that you could become a literal child of God.

Because He died and resurrected, we can receive Eternal Life as He has now. We receive this through the Holy Spirit, which is the resurrected Jesus living in you. He will literally live in you and guide you. You will no longer be a restless wanderer on the earth like Cain. You will have divine direction and guidance. You will be filled with hope and purpose! You will have a home in an eternal Kingdom.

Those who followed Jesus during his earthly ministry were called disciples. They received the Holy Spirit after his resurrection in John 20:19-23. This made them children of God.

In Acts 2:1-4, the Baptism of God's Spirit was poured out on His disciples. It is an infilling and overflowing of God's Spirit. It

manifested with speaking in a new language – a spiritual language from God. God was using this spiritual language to bring the disciples of Christ into unity under Him. This awesome gift ignited those who believed in Jesus to go out and share the good news of Jesus with others. It helped them share the message of hope and purpose.

There were 12 leaders or captains called Apostles that led the work after Jesus resurrected. These Apostles were the believers who organized and directed the message of Christ to the entire world. Most of the early disciples and Apostles of the Lord were killed for serving God and spreading the message of God's Kingdom. The fact that these men were willing to die is a testimony to the fact that these events actually happened!

From the early Apostles until now, there has always been a voice calling out in the wilderness of this world, telling the world about the Way back to God; telling people about the Way to the Tree of Life.

For us to enter into the Kingdom of God, we must repent. We must turn from the way of life that causes us and others hurt, pain, and strife. **We must ask God to forgive us for disobeying His Ten Commandments or Spiritual Law. Ask Him for a new life. Ask Him for the opportunity to be HIS CHILD!**

When we do this, we can receive Christ's sacrifice. This will give you the Holy Spirit and make you a child of God. He wipes away your past sins and forgives the penalty of death you deserve. This is the beginning of your Covenant with God.

The next step is to be Baptized or fully immersed in water. This is the public sealing of your private confession of faith. Baptism in water is dying to your old self and old ways of living life. When you come up out of the water, you are raised with Christ into a New Life.

The Elders of the Church will then lay hands on you and pray for

you to receive the Baptism of the Holy Spirit.

This new life will not be like your old life. Your new life will have hope, excitement, and contentment. You will be a unique and special member of God's Kingdom. People will come against you for this new life, but they can never take away your hope. They cannot take away the fact that you are now a child of God.

Chapter 3

Your New Life

Your old life involved heartache, pain, and hurt that did not produce anything positive. It was a life of death. When Jesus came, He showed us the new life that we are to live. It involves changing the way we work, the way we eat, the way we handle money, and what we celebrate.

With the Holy Spirit, you have the power of God inside of you. We all have frustrations in life – anger, guilt, and hurt – now you will have power to overcome.

We engage God with faith. The Bible tells us that, “Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see” (Hebrews 11:1). Though we cannot see God with our natural eyes, we trust that He will guide us. The Bible also says that, “...without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him” (Hebrews 11:6). We must believe that God exists. He will reward you in the coming Kingdom of God for seeking and living for Him.

The Bible also tells us that faith without works is dead (James Chapter 2). This means that our faith will accompany works. In Ephesians 2:8-10, we learn, “8 For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— 9 not by works, so that no one can boast. 10 For we are God’s handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.”

There are works God has prepared for us to do before we were even saved. When we are saved, we will live a certain way. There are fundamental works that are characteristic of our new life.

To continue learning about your new life,
